About Sharing together 2023 to 2024



We want to give funding for ideas that help people in the arts work together.



Working together is also called **networking**. A group of people working together is a **network**.



We think this is really important because of Covid-19.



We really want to help work that supports working with lots of different types of people.



And making sure people can get involved who sometimes may not get the chance.

BLACK LIVES MATTER



We also want people to keep talking about **Black Lives Matter** and **We Shall Not be Removed**.



These are movements that stand up for equality for minority groups – like black people and disabled people.



We believe these movements are really important in the arts.



We want to hear about all sorts of ideas.

But we are really interested in supporting ideas about:



- Working with people from different backgrounds.



- Deaf, disabled and **neurodiverse** groups.



Neurodiverse means people whose minds work in different ways.



- People who come from different countries and cultures.



- Working with other people who may not have the same chances to enjoy the arts. For example, because of where they live. Or because they don't have enough money.



- We would like to have applications for funding from people who may not have the same chances to work in arts.



Networks might be small groups or larger groups.



They may meet often or may not.



Some groups may just meet online.



Networks are important for things like:

- Sharing information
- Sharing skills
- Supporting each other
- Sharing equipment
- Talking through ideas.



We can support new **networks**. And **networks** that already exist.

We can give some money for:



- The cost of running a meeting where people can talk about setting up a new **network**.



- The costs of setting up online meetings or groups.



Helping an existing **network** develop. For example, making their **network** grow.



We can support lots of different types of **networks**.



We would like to see how new **networks** will be helpful to other people.



And see how the **network** can last.

How to apply for funding



We can give up to £3000 for each project.



To apply you will need to use our [online portal](#).



If you have not used the portal before, you will need to register first. There are instructions for how to do this on our website here: <https://portal.arts.wales>

You should:



1. **Fill out a Sharing Together 2023-24 application form on our online portal.**



2. **Upload the following things to the online portal with your application form:**



Give us a description of your project. This should include:

- What you want to do and why
- Why this work is needed
- The people and organisations you think you will work with
- How you will get them involved
- How it will help the people taking part



You can do this in writing, or in a video **or** voice recording.



If you are doing this in **writing**:

- Please do not write more than 2 sides of A4 paper.



If you are sending a **video or voice recording**:

- If you are sending a **video or voice recording**, please make sure your recording is no more than 5 minutes long.

3. Clearly explain how you plan to use the money.

We can cover **all** of your project costs. As long as it is not over **£3000**. We can cover things like:



- Room hire
- Food and drink
- Paying a person to give a talk or support the group
- Equipment
- Software needed for work



We can **only** cover things like travel costs for people who are speaking or have a main role.



We can help organisations who are not based in Wales. As long as the **network** is going to be in Wales.



And the **network** can include people from outside Wales.

What happens if you get the funding



We will ask for a short report about the meetings or work that happens.



For example, how many people get involved. And what you do and plan to do going forward.



We will keep back up to £300 of your funding. We will pay it when we have had your report.

When to apply



You can apply by **5pm on Thursday 13 July 2023.**



Please make sure you include **all** the supporting information you need to with your application form.



A group of staff at the Arts Council of Wales will decide who gets the funding.



We will do our best to tell you what we decide no later than 6 weeks after the deadline date.
